

The research indicates that achievement gains realized by students whose teachers rely on formative assessment can range from 15 to 25 percentile points.



2013-14 SITE IMPROVEMENT PROGRESS REPORT AND 2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

2013-14 PROGRESS REPORT

- <u>GOAL #1</u>: We will demonstrate increased proficiency for each student in the essential learning of content areas.
- Year 3 Goal Completed
- PLC groups have shifted over the time of this goal to more of a content area focus which has increased the focus on essential learning.

PROGRESS REPORT

- GOAL #2: We will provide increased opportunities for students to apply oral communication skills, to include expanding spring student led conferences.
- Year 2 Goal Completed
- Adjustments are still needed. Parent survey's show that even thought parents are attending, they would like to see discussion topics adjusted

PROGRESS REPORT

- Goal #3: We will maintain a low school-wide disciplinary referral level and begin to implement elements of Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports.
- Year 2 Goal Completed
- This goal will transfer into a Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) Goal for the next 2 years.

2014-15 MIDDLE SCHOOL SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

- OBJECTIVE #1: To provide time for our teachers to analyze summative and formative data which will be used to differentiate their curriculum.
- EVIDENCE OF NEED: 2013-14 MCA data showed the Middle School scored 10.6% higher than the state average in Mathematics and 11.0% higher in Reading.

WANTING TO KEEP RAISING THE BAR

ACHIEVEMENT GOAL

- Middle School Students will score 12% higher than the state average on the 2014-15 MCA Mathematics test.
- Middle School Students will score 13% higher than the state average on the 2014-15 MCA Reading test

HOW WILL WE GET THERE?

- Continuing with our hour late start for PLC work allows us to analyze student data regularly and address individual needs more effectively.
- Multi-Tier System of Support (MTSS) at the Middle School is new intervention in Mathematics and Reading

2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

- OBJECTIVE #2: Multi-Tier System of Support (MTSS) Coaches will look at MAP and MCA data to identify a group of students who they will support and create classroom interventions that will increase the student's academic success.
- Middle School MTSS Coaches are: Dan Meyers in Mathematics, Leah Sand in Reading and Rachael Hudson working with Behaviors

2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

EVIDENCE OF NEED

- 2013-14 MCA data showed 67.2% of Middle School students were Proficient in Mathematics and 68.2% in Reading.
- English Language Learners, students in Special Education and students receiving Free or Reduced lunches scored only slightly above or below the state average.

2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

• ACHIEVEMENT GOAL: 75% of the students identified by the MTSS Coaches will improve from "Does Not Meet Standard" to "Partially Meets Standard" or from "Partially Meets Standard" to "Meets Standard" in Mathematics and Reading.

EARLY CONCERN

- After doing their data analysis they found over 100 students (all grades) in Math and in Reading that did not meet or partially met standards on the MCA and were falling below grade level on the MAP test.
- Focusing on 29 Reading and 42 Math Students for the 2014-15 school year.
- Only one hour a day to devote to this group of students.

PLAN OF ACTION

- Coaches analyzed MAP and MCA data to create a focus group of students to support.
- Coaches work on supporting these students in their core classes as well as working on individual skill development.
- Coaches will track progress through formative and summative assessments throughout the year

2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

 OBJECTIVE #3: We will look at a specific group of students who have struggled in Science in the past and work to improve their organization skills, study habits and build self-confidence through a specialized Science Program (GeoScience Plus).

2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

- <u>EVIDENCE NEED:</u> 51.3% of last years 8th graders scored as being proficient on the 2013-14 MCA Science Test.
- Important Items to Note:
 - Little or no guidance from the MDE on what topics are tested.
 - Only tested in 8th grade. No opportunity to improve individual students scores at the Middle School.

2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

• <u>ACHIEVEMENT GOAL:</u> Middle School 8th graders 2014-15 MCA Science results will be 10% higher than the Minnesota state average.

WHAT IS THE PLAN?

- We will continue offering after school GeoScience help sessions through our Middle School Youth Center on Wednesday's.
- Build off the success of our Geography Plus class by creating a GeoScience Plus class.
- 8th Grade GeoScience Teachers are analyzing MCA Data, looking at curriculum and sequencing of topics they cover prior to the MCA test.

WHAT ARE PLUS CLASSES?

- Geography and GeoScience Plus has 23 8th graders who have not met or partially met standards on the MCA Math and Reading tests.
- Plus students are students who need help with organization and study skills
- Plus students are students who do not see themselves continuing their education beyond high school.
- Weekly seminar, Cornell Notes and Speakers on different careers are incorporated into the ciriculum

2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

- OBJECTIVE #4: To provide the flexibility necessary for all secondary professional learning communities to set meaningful goals that reflect their area of teaching expertise.
- EVIDENCE OF NEED: Mathematics, Reading and Science are the only subjects who's curriculum is directly connected to state data.

GOAL AND PLAN

- <u>ACHIEVEMENT GOAL:</u> We will show increased proficiency for each student in the essential learning of all content areas.
- PLAN: All full time staff members are active participants in weekly Professional Learning Community's and will show evidence of practice twice a year.

2014-15 SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

- OBJECTIVE #5: We will continue to work on implementing a Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) program with full implementation at the start of the 2015-16 school year.
- EVIDENCE OF NEED: The Middle School PBIS team will complete the two year training to fully implement this District and State supported program.

GOAL AND PLAN

- **GOAL:** To fully implement PBIS into the climate at the Middle School, with 80% or greater support from all staff members
- <u>PLAN</u>: We will continue to add parts of PBIS throughout the 2014-15 school year.
