

SEE 2018 Legislative Platform:

-A draft of the 2018 Legislative Platform has been prepared for final approval by SEE membership in October.

- -Key areas of focus continue to be referendum and debt service equalization and adequate funding, including at least a 1% increase to the basic funding formula for the 2018-19 school year and an increase in the state's share of special education funding as well as key policy changes.
- -Dr. Hillmann participated in developing this platform.

Dr.Bill Morris' recent survey focusing on public perceptions of K12 Education and the political landscape:

Key take-aways include:

- -Nearly 60% of those surveyed feel Minnesota is heading in the right direction.
- -Education was viewed as the most important issue in the state by an increased margin of 7%. Next closest issue was Health Care at 20%.
- -Of those surveyed 62% supported a mandatory inflation increase in education funding.
- -55% also supported a 1% broad sales tax for education.
- -60% favor the state paying the total cost of special education.

ESSA Update: (Every Student Succeeds Act-replaces MN's NCLB waiver)

- -The state's plan was submitted for approval to the U.S. Department of Education in mid-September. Response expected in 120 days.
- -Our state's plan was developed over the course of several months with considerable input from stakeholders across the state.
- -Some changes to accountability measures after the 2017-18 school year. There is also emphasis being placed on ensuring students are receiving a well-rounded education. Those indicators will be developed for use after the 2020-21 school year and will include career and college readiness.

The District Curriculum and Staff Development Committee and the District Tech Steering Committee held a retreat on Tuesday, August 22, to work on combining the two committees. We decided to name our new committee Northfield Enact (not an acronym, just referencing our goals for development and learning in action).

Jason Molesky was the keynote speaker with the topic of "Raising the Bar." Jason discussed the role of technology in student learning, the environment, and teacher professional growth.

We focused on developing a vision for our top work priorities. First, we brainstormed about what today's world is like and came up with "instant," "fast-changing," with "many expectations and things to focus on," and a "headline culture of catchy snippets (not deep reading/understanding)." Then we considered the Apple Corporation's view of our world as "mobile, connected, and global."

The following priorities rose to the top of our discussion. (While they may not be directly related to technology, it is the integration of technology into the classroom that supports our students' learning.)

- Consistency
- Critical thinking
- Engagement
- Connections, and
- Collaboration

When measuring where we are in implementing our goals, Jason proposed that we should consider these three levels: Introducing, Integrating, and Innovating.

Along with the above discussion, committee leaders Mary Grace Hanson and Kim Briske will communicate the following changes and updates to the administrative team through meetings and the superintendent weekly bulletin, and to all teachers via email.

New Committee Parameters for Northfield Enact--

- We are bringing together two committees that have operated differently in the past.
- Northfield Enact will meet twice each year: Once in late fall (agenda: capital budget items) and once in early spring (agenda: professional learning for the next school year).
- The Title II funds that were used to pay DCSDC members for after school meetings will no longer be available after this year. Additional pay for meetings will not be an option, as it is not sustainable or equitable.

New grant process for Northfield Enact (formerly the PLC grants)--Additional dollars are available for these grants--previously \$6,000, now \$18,000. Application and approval will be done digitally through our Schoology group with a link available on our website.

Grants --

- Must have a SMART goal (does not have to be a PLC goal). Teachers can work together across grade levels or subjects on a grant SMART goal.
- Must have accountability measures in application and a means of sharing results with a list of options.
- Must plan for sustainability if applicable, such as ongoing needs for materials, subscriptions, etc.
- Cannot be repeated/resubmitted for multiple years.
- Can pay for teacher and student materials or conferences (Limit of two people per conference, no mileage, meals or lodging).
- Cannot pay staff for additional work time.
- Will be split between each semester, with carryover from first semester available in second semester; no year-to-year carryover.
