 Presenting the School Improvement Plan for the Area Learning Center was Director Daryl Kehler. The ALC identified attendance and credit completion, as well as ensuring that all graduating seniors have a post- secondary life plan for employment, as the goals they will continue to work on during the 2015-2016 school year.

The Community Services' site improvement plan was presented by Director Erin Bailey and Breezy Barrett, Ventures Coordinator. They spoke about the progress being made on the implementation of the Collective Impact Initiative in the community and engaging the Ventures childcare sites in a continuous improvement model. These initiatives are directly impacting the community's Northfield Promise initiative. They closed their presentation by citing some interesting facts for fiscal year 2014-2015:

- 40,827 children, youth and adults participated in a Community Services program (a 9,000 person increase over last year – due to the Greenvale Park Community School and more guidelines from MDE)
- 98,763 people had access to a school district facility through Community Services (a nearly 15,000 person increase over last year)
- Community Services provided scholarships to 237 program participants in 31 program areas. These scholarships totaled \$7,615.

Strategic Plan Curricular Outcomes - We will implement a consistent, comprehensive and challenging set of curricular outcomes that reach and engage all learners.

<u>DEPAC 2014-15 Teaching and Learning</u> – The District will implement consistent standards-based grading strategies and procedures at the elementary level, and continue studying standards-based grading at the secondary level during 2014-15.

Measurable Evidence of Need: MCA III data indicate reading proficiency rates continue to be above state average. Because reading is a critical element in each child's education, we will again focus on it as one of our building goals. We will focus on three main areas: fluency, comprehension and word knowledge. With the adoption of common core standards for English, it is relevant to build word knowledge and vocabulary in both fiction and nonfiction context. Also in keeping with the common core standards, our reading instruction will reflect an increased focus on nonfiction text and nonfiction reading strategies. Students are being asked to read more complex texts in content areas, so a focus on academic vocabulary is an important part of our work. As the material becomes more difficult and the volume of work expands, students who are not reading fluently have a difficult time keeping up with schoolwork.

Assessments, authentic and formal, will be ongoing in both comprehension and fluency. We will use MCA scores to measure overall progress. We will use MAP target growth scores to measure individual and classroom progress. And finally, we will use formative assessments as a part of instruction to provide the information needed to adjust teaching and learning while they are happening.

Student SMART Achievement Goal:

61% of Sibley 2nd Graders met or exceeded their individualized growth target on the NWEA-MAP (Reading) Fall to Fall Assessment in 2015.
66% of Sibley 3rd Graders met or exceeded their individualized growth target on the NWEA-MAP (Reading) Fall to Fall Assessment in 2015.
61% of Sibley 4th Graders met or exceeded their individualized growth target on the NWEA-MAP (Reading) Fall to Fall Assessment in 2015.
53% of Sibley 5th Graders met or exceeded their individualized growth target on the NWEA-MAP (Reading) Fall to Fall Assessment in 2015.
Sibley 4th grade English Learners had a +0.6089 "Z" score as measured on the MCA Reading assessment.
Sibley 5th grade English Learners had a -0.0190 "Z" score as measured on the MCA Reading assessment.

We know our students better, because we are getting more refined in looking at the data. Ready, Set, Go day gives us initial information about students as readers before the school year even starts. Classroom teachers along with the reading support staff are quickly able to analyze data to determine the level of support students need. We take a closer look at students performing below grade level to determine interventions to meet individual's need with the goal of success for all. Flex grouping has helped teachers differentiate instruction to meet varying needs of students.

What implications do this year's results have for 2015-16:

We continue to use data to work smarter and help us meet the needs of all students. The addition of more Minnesota Reading Corps members will help serve more struggling readers. A consistent team of reading support helps us be more efficient. We know which students need extra help in reading and can target their interventions almost immediately at the start of the year. The addition of ADSIS reading support will allow for even more students to be served in the area of reading.

With the adoption of common core standards for English, it is relevant to build word knowledge and vocabulary in both fiction and nonfiction context. Also in keeping with the common core standards, our reading instruction will reflect an increased focus on nonfiction text and nonfiction reading strategies. Students are being asked to read more complex texts in content areas, so a focus on academic vocabulary is an important part of our work. As the material becomes more difficult and the volume of work expands, students who are not reading fluently have a difficult time keeping up with schoolwork.
